My key issues which cover all of the questions

- 1 Building the narrative of good practice so that it becomes 'normal ' in day to day work of agencies . How to use Professional Codes of practice as tool of change . What is the role of qualifying training and post qualifying training in raising awareness before improving practice.
- 2 The challenges of labelling which lead to agencies ignoring the needs of vulnerable children. How can we move the narrative within agencies so that they do what they should do (not skirting around in poor practice)
- 3 Does labelling as 'victim' get better outcomes . As a strength based practitioner I struggle with the need to demonstrate vulnerability but often its only strategy that works ?
- 4 Re policy changes regulator do something about poor practice / celebrate what we do well
- 5 Are there better labels than non discrimination how can research reframe our narrative?
